The Noise of Politics

We watch as the jets fly in

Walter Brueggemann encouraged Christians to take the Bible seriously, asking tough questions and speaking up for justice, especially for the poor and marginalized. He is renowned for his "prophetic imagination," encouraging the church to imagine and live out new possibilities for justice, compassion, and faithfulness and taught that the church should provide a "counternarrative" to popular trends like consumerism or nationalism, continuing the work of biblical prophets who challenged the powerful for the sake of the vulnerable.

Brueggemann ordained in the United Church of Christ, was born in Tilden, Nebraska in 1933, and was the son of a German Evangelical pastor. He earned a Th.D. from Union Theological Seminary in 1961, and a Ph.D. in education from Saint Louis University in 1974.

A few of the many book that he has written include:

The Prophetic Imagination (1978)

Widely considered his seminal work and most-read book, it explores the prophetic role of the church and scripture in challenging empire and injustice.

Sabbath as Resistance: Saying No to the Culture of Now (2014)

Praised for its practical, prophetic call to Sabbath-keeping as a form of resistance to consumer culture.

Spirituality of the Psalms (2001)

A highly rated book focused on the spirituality and structure of the Psalms.

Praying the Psalms: Engaging Scripture and the Life of the Spirit (1986)

Beloved for its practical guidance on prayer and the use of Psalms in spiritual life.

The Practice of Prophetic Imagination: Preaching an Emancipating Word (2012)

Recent work revisiting his central themes about prophecy and hope in contemporary preaching.

For ten years, the Hike to End Hunger has united community members, local businesses, and advocates in a shared mission: to ensure no one in our area goes hungry. This year, as federal food assistance programs face severe cuts, our food pantry is seeing a surge in need - families, children, and seniors who never imagined they'd require help are turning to us for support.

Join Rio Grande Food Project for a fun morning at Pat Hurley Park and enjoy a heart-healthy walk, partner organizations, food trucks, face painting, and Albuquerque's own Headphone Dance Party! The family friendly trail is stroller and dog friendly. Hike starts along the park's lower loop area with a gradual incline up to the park's upper loop area with one of the best views of the city. The Lower Loop and Upper Loop Trails combined are 1.1 miles, and if you prefer a longer hike, you can double the Upper Loop or choose from 3 different stair trails for a more strenuous workout.

ADULT EDUCATION IN OCTOBER

Following the monthly extended fellowship hour on October 5, there will be a 2-week series (October 12 and 19) on **Transgender 201** with Adrien Lawyer, Co-Director and Co-Founder of the Transgender Resource Center of New Mexico. Despite gains in visibility and acceptance, transgender people continue to face enormous everyday challenges including discrimination, poverty, unemployment, restricted access to health care and housing, and sometimes horrific violence. Adrien will continue from his presentations last year to help us better understand what it means to be transgender, some common misconceptions about transgender people, and the challenges they face. Whether or not you heard him last year, come to learn about transgender people and how to be an advocate for understanding.

Then on October 26, John San Nicolas will offer a history of **Christian Nationalism** in the United States and its continuing influence in American politics.
